AIRFIELD HOUSE - The Airfield Trust was established by Letitia & Naomi Overend to keep the Airfield Estate intact for educational/recreational purposes. The Overends' life & times can be appreciated via the Airfield House exhibition. A working farm with a milking Jersey herd, sheep, pigs, chickens, donkeys & 50 laying hens. Two farmers on hand to guide visitors through daily milkings, egg collecting, mucking out & feeding. Farmyard allows easy access to animals, milking parlour & dairy kitchen. ARDGILLAN CASTLE - Large 18th C country manor house (1738) built in extensive parklands overlooking Irish Sea. Demesne features a walled garden & a rose garden. THE ARK - A unique, purpose-built cultural centre in the heart of Dublin's Temple Bar, where children aged 2-12 can explore theatre, music, literature, art, film, & dance. Varied programme of performances, exhibitions & creative workshops. Busy schedule for primary school children. Housed on site of a former Presbyterian Meeting House (1728); carefully restored front facade of the church. 1,500 sqm. housing a theatre, a gallery and a workshop. AVIVA STADIUM – Aviva Stadium, also known as Lansdowne Road, is the home stadium of the Irish football and rugby teams. It has capacity for over 50,000 spectators and is Ireland's first, and only, UEFA Category 4 Stadium. BANK OF IRELAND (HOUSE OF LORDS) – Former Irish Houses of Parliament. World's first purposebuilt two-chamber parliament house. Built 1729. BLESSINGTON STREET BASIN - A picturesque walled park with a landscaped walk around a large lake and with plenty of places to sit. Built in the early 19th century to provide a clean water supply to the north of the city. Completely refurbished in 1993/94 and now a quiet city haven, providing a "secret garden" for local residents and visitors alike. THE CHURCH - Former St. Mary's Church of Ireland. One of earliest examples of a galleried church in Dublin. Built at beginning of 18th century, it boasts many outstanding features (spectacular stained-glass window). Historical figures associated with St. Mary's include Arthur Guinness, Sean O'Casey, Wolfe Tone, John Wesley, Jonathan Swift and G.F. Handel. St. Mary's closed in 1964 and lay derelict for a number of years. Beautifully restored, it is now a café, bar and restaurant. DUBLIN CASTLE – Operated as a military fortress, a prison, treasury, courts of law and seat of English administration in Ireland for 700 years. The **State Apartments** were built as residential & public quarters of the Viceregal Court; seat of the executive, the focus of a fashionable social life. Today the Castle is the venue for Ireland's Presidencies of the EU, for Presidential inaugurations & for prestigious functions. The **Undercroft** is sited in the Lower Castle Yard. The **Chapel Royal** is a gothic revival building, famous for its vaulting, plaster decoration, carved oaks & galleries. A guided tour of the State Apartments/Undercroft/ Chapel Royal is available. The **Revenue Museum** documents the varied activities of the Revenue Commissioners over several centuries. Housed in the crypt of the Chapel Royal. FOUR COURTS – Iconic site where the country's legal system was originally housed under one roof (late 18th century). Seriously damaged during Irish civil war (1922). No heritage tours available but visitors can wander around; visitors are also welcome to go into courtrooms and observe most cases. 14 HENRIETTA STREET - Dating from the 1720s, Henrietta Street is the most intact collection of early to mid-18th century aristocratic townhouses in Ireland. These vast houses were divided into tenements from the 1870s to the 1890s to house the city's working poor. The last families left in the late 1970s. The museum tells the story of the building's shifting fortunes, from family home and power base to courthouse; from barracks to its final incarnation as a tenement. Fine entrance hall, stone main staircase, neoclassical plasterwork. Public areas include Archive Reading Rooms and Architecture Gallery (including exhibitions which make the Archive's holdings accessible to all).

IRISH FAMINE EXHIBITION - This exhibition tells the story of what happened during those horrific years. The exhibition uses rare 19th century photographs, witness accounts, and contemporary sketches, as well as maps and statistical information. IVEAGH TRUST FLAT MUSEUM - Flat 3B on Bull Alley Estate is the only Iveagh Trust flat which has remained largely unchanged since the first tenants took up occupancy in 1904. Furniture & fittings were acquired from the last tenants, the Molloy family. The flat contains a living room & 2 bedrooms (one doubling as a food prep. area). Outside on the landing is a communal sink, w/c, and storage cupboard (for coal). Nellie Molloy, one of six children, continued to live in the flat until her death at the age of 95 in 2002. The flat is now a museum, a visual reminder of how families lived in early 20th century Dublin tenements. Viewing can be arranged for small groups by appointment only (phone 01 454 2312, during office hours Mon-Fri). JAMES JOYCE HOUSE OF THE DEAD - One of Dublin's most interesting literary and historic buildings. The setting where Joyce set his famous short story, "The Dead" and where director John Huston located his film of the story. Currently closed (the house is being sold by receivers). 15 Usher's Island, Dublin 8.

JAMES JOYCE TOWER - The Martello Tower on Sandycove Point is one of a series of 15 similar towers built around Dublin in 1804 to counter the threat of an invasion by Napoleon. Demilitarised in 1904, the tower was rented to Oliver St John Gogarty, who invited the 22-year-old James Joyce to join him. The first chapter of "Ulysses" (1922) was set here. The tower was bought in 1954 by the architect Michael Scott. He and his friends set up the James Joyce Museum, which opened in 1962. KILMAINHAM GAOL - One of the largest unoccupied gaols in Europe. Outstanding guided tour. LIBERTY MARKET – The Liberty Market is one of Dublin's longest running markets, celebrating its 50th anniversary in 2023. MANSION HOUSE – Official residence of Dublin's Lord Mayor. Built as townhouse (1705) for Joshua Dawson, developer of Dawson Street & Nassau Street. Sold to Dublin Corporation in 1715. Only mayoral residence in Ireland still used for original purpose. Oldest mayoral residence in Ireland & UK (older than London by 15 years). Oldest free-standing house in Dublin. MARLAY PARK WALLED GARDEN – The Walled Gardens were restored in 2000. You enter through the head gardener's house and tea rooms, and see a Regency-style ornamental garden, featuring an extensive display of colourful period plants, ranging from herbaceous borders to shrub beds.
